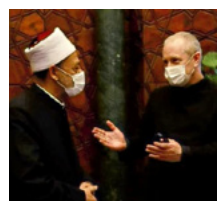
*'Sing to the Lord, all the earth!

Snapshots from our Global Partners

Burundi



We eagerly await the visit of Bishop Aimé Joseph and Mama Bénigne Kimararungu (Gitega Diocese) and Bishop Seth & Mama Yvette Ndayirukiye (Matana Diocese) for our Kingdom Voices week 8-15th August, and look forward to hearing first hand some of the stories of the exciting developments that are taking place in Burundi. It is particularly striking that the church is focussing on growth and church planting despite the challenges of Covid 19 and climate change. As new churches sprout up it has been great to hear about the 13 ordained students at Gitega Bible School who will soon be helping to lead the congregations. The new bicycles, provided via CMSI earlier this year, will enable them to carry out their ministries in rural areas.

Kenya

We celebrate with our partners in Kajiado the upcoming pastoral visit to the Diocese by the Most Rev'd Jackson Ole Sapit, Archbishop of Kenya, at the end of June. He is the first Maasai to lead the Anglican Church of Kenya and is originally from Narok (just 150km north west of Kajiado town) and will conduct the visit together with Bishop Gaddiel Lenini. Meanwhile in UDP the Tujisaidie School has been constructing a much needed playground with the support funding from Bishops' Appeal, while the Tumaini African Foundation have opened a new, well-stocked library for the use of young people in the community.



Nepal

While still deeply mourning the loss of BA, we are very encouraged that BJ is committed to continuing the ministry of SDSS, supported by the team at SD Church alongside BK and G and also her brother D. Looking back at the Children's Heart and Rehabilitation Care

Uganda

Tom and Gemma Withers on STEP placement at Kiwoko Hospital, enjoyed spending Easter Sunday with the congregation at St Mark's Cathedral in Luweero town, followed by a feast of Ugandan food at Bishop Eridard and Mama Jane's home. Pray for them as they visit Evas at Chilli Children in SW Uganda during May; and that the remainder of their time overseas will be a time for God to work in and through them as they share their physiotherapy skills.



Madi West Nile

Victoria (in yellow below with her class and teachers) is a 5 year old from South Sudan who lives in Bidibidi Refugee Settlement. Her parents died during the war in South Sudan and she was rescued by a good Samaritan, Mr Juma Samuel, who brought her along to Ariye Nursery School. Victoria enjoys singing and is in the children's church choir. She hopes to become a pastor in the future because she wants to help people and pray for them.

Many children in Bidi Bidi had no access to education before Ariye Nursery School was developed by Madi West Nile Diocese with support from CMSI. Victoria is now taking her first steps in achieving her dream.



Zambia



CMSI continue to be committed to supporting the work of St John's Theological Seminary in the Diocese of Northern Zambia. Canon Francis Mwansa, seminary rector, reports that this year's cohort of 10 students are progressing well in their studies and are preparing for summer placements in dioceses around Zambia. Remember the staff as they prayerfully consider the best way to provide and deliver high quality theological education for this new generation of Zambian church leaders. These young men have the potential to make a great impact for the Kingdom of God, as they learn to teach the truth of God's word and minister in an ever-changing world.

DR Congo



Over the past few weeks we have been reading of thousands of refugees fleeing Eastern Congo into South West Uganda. Abraham and Teresa Kasika, counsellors at the North Kivu children's project who live very close to the border, have called the situation a 'human catastrophe'.

Two parishes in North Kivu were involved in the most recent massacre, and Bishop Isesomo reports that those parishes are now completely emptied of people. He was receiving phone calls from folks who were desperate for transport assistance, a place to stay and food supplies. With available DRC emergency appeal, CMSI was able to transfer funds immediately to boost the church's response.

We celebrate with Kindu Diocese as the new Diocese of Kalima has emerged from the growing number of parishes in Kindu. Bishop Kangamina Sadiki Christophe has been enthroned as the first bishop of this new diocese. Missionary bishop, Bishop Elisha, continues to develop the new Diocese of Lac Tanginika alongside Bukavu Diocese. The Archdeacons are enjoying the freedom to visit their rural parishes because of their new motorbikes received through CMSI support.

Province of Alexandria

Prompted by the message of Easter, the Cairo Prison Ministry Team were facilitated by church leaders to visit the prisoners. They said:

'We have celebrated Easter behind bars with those incarcerated to show them that Jesus' resurrection was not just for the free, but more importantly it was for them.'

This was an uncommon opportunity for prisoners to participate in Holy Communion and receive pastoral care and individual prayer. Assisted by a parish link in Ireland, the team were able to purchase food, clothes, and toiletries as Easter gifts, commenting;

'These things may seem very little to us, but they make a huge difference in the prisoners' lives and their emotional well-being. We all need to feel cared for by others, and to experience God's love. The diocese and inmates thank you for your support and donations.'

The church in Egypt continuously demonstrates outreach to those, like the prisoners, on the margins of society. Their focus on Christians from Sudan over many years has enabled theological training of more than a dozen pastors at the Nuba Mountain Bible Institute through support from another link parish in Ireland. One of these students recently returned back to the Nuba Mountains as Diocesan Secretary in a new diocese in the area. He was sent with a small gift to purchase a keyboard to assist with outreach and worship.



South Sudan



This month the World Food Programme (WFP) reported that almost eight million people in South Sudan are facing severe food insecurity, a crisis which is deepening due to the rise in cost of staple items and fuel caused by the war in Ukraine. Matthew Hollingworth of the WFP says

'With peace, we could be making the difference to ensure that communities in South Sudan wouldn't have to be concerned about wars 7,000 miles away, and the impact of those wars on availability and access in their community, because they would be able to look after themselves. They would be able to meet their own needs.'

In Ibba the church led, by Bishop Wilson, plays its part by continuing a strategic programme of peace building. The present focus is on building the leadership capacity of chiefs, women and young people. Recently CMSI was able to support Maridi Diocese in a micro-finance programme for vulnerable young women, many of whom are lone parents. The church is working hard to build peace and help individuals meet their own needs. Flower, a single mother in Olo Diocese, has been chosen by the Diocese for training to become a midwife for the local community, her training will be supported by a link parish in Ireland. In Yei, the Vocational Training College continues to provide training and skills building, support from Misan Cara has enabled YVTC to provide 20 places specifically for those recently returned from refugee camps.
